- **eSports 2013 Case**-- Released for the 2013 ESL One Katowice competition. Just a couple of thousand were granted, and it never returned.

- **Revolver Case**-- Released to accompany the Revolver Case weapon set. Its exclusivity originates from the brief window throughout which it could be made.

- **Gods and Monsters Case**-- A community-created case that was only offered for a brief duration in 2015.
- **Chroma 2 Case**-- Though still technically obtainable, its original drop rate was lower than many, and it is thought about "unusual" by numerous traders.

1. **Steam Community Market (SCM)**-- The most uncomplicated technique is to purchase directly from the SCM. Costs reflect current supply and demand, and sellers can note any case they own.
2. **Third-Party Trading Platforms**-- Sites such as Buff163, Skinport, and Dmarket typically host listings with small discount rates. However, purchasers should validate the platform's credibility to avoid scams.
3. **In-Game Drops**-- For cases that still periodically drop (e.g., Chroma 2), players can increase their chances by taking part in main Valve operations or by using active servers. The drop rate stays low, so patience is important.
4. **Occasion Giveaways**-- Occasionally, Valve or partner tournaments host free gifts where gamers can win an uncommon case. Watching on official announcements and social media channels ensures opportunities are not missed.

Purchasing Rare Cases: Risks and Rewards
