As soon as a skin leaves the official store, its fate is turned over to the player-driven Steam Community Market and third-party trading websites, where supply and demand dictate its cost.

Several factors influence the cost of a *Rust* skin:

- **Streamer and Creator Endorsements:** Skins produced in collaboration with popular material developers often see massive spikes in popularity and cost.
