2. Fixing Sagging or Misaligned Hinged Glass Doors

Hinged glass doors-- such as interior glass doors or outdoor patio French doors-- frequently struggle with gravity. The heavy glass panel puts immense stress on the hinges, triggering the door to sag and scrape versus the limit.

- **Action 2: Clean the Surface**Wipe down the application location with rubbing alcohol to make sure a clean, dust-free surface for the brand-new adhesive.
- **Step 3: Install the New Material**Measure the boundary of the door frame and cut the new weatherstripping to size. Press securely into place, guaranteeing a tight seal when the door is closed without making it excessively difficult to lock.
