Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Incredibly worn, rusted, or faded. Sometimes valued for special "blackimov" results.

Keep in mind: Some skins are "capped," suggesting they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float versions extremely rare and expensive.
