

Should I Inform the Event Professional If the Gathering Is Unexpected At the Very Beginning?

In short, yes: definitely. Right when you first contact a coordinator, you should disclose that the gathering is unexpected.

Your planner is your ally in making the surprise work—but they can only achieve that if they understand the nature of the event.

Why Your Planner Needs to Know

The most important reason to tell your planner early is that almost every element of the organization will have to be approached differently for a secret party.

How invitees are informed must stress confidentiality. Managing suppliers needs sensitive scheduling and confidentiality. The space must be secured and organized without informing the celebrant.

If you don't tell your planner, they might unintentionally compromise the hidden nature in conversations or by arriving for setup at the wrong time.

What Happens When You Tell Your Planner Early

When you tell your planner early that it's a surprise, several things happen.

To begin with, they can incorporate secrecy into the plan. Every detail is planned around maintaining the surprise.

Furthermore, they can bring their skill to anticipate and prevent leaks and to address the specialized issues of secret parties.

Moreover, they can add nondisclosure terms with professionals and arrange for shipments and setups so that the guest of honor never sees anything.

Fourth, they can handle all attendee coordination with clear instructions about secrecy and can additionally support you develop the excuse for the honoree.

Why Secrecy from Your Planner Backfires

If you don't tell your planner, various problems can occur.

They might send decorations when the honoree is present. They might reach out with details that the honoree sees or hears.

They might arrange a site visit when the honoree might come along or communicate with the birthday person directly without realizing they're the secret person.



In short, failing to disclose the hidden nature to your professional is a major oversight you can commit when organizing a secret celebration.

What Level of Detail Does Your Planner Need

Now that you see the value of transparency, you may be asking: what information is essential.

To put it clearly: share all the details that impacts the hidden nature.

That includes who the celebrant is, their typical schedule and availability, their likes and dislikes, who should and shouldn't be invited, and any things that might go wrong that could reveal the surprise.

The more your planner knows, the more effectively they can plan and the more likely the unexpected gathering will be wonderful.
