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A healthy septic system is a quiet partner. When it works, you barely consider it. When it stops working, you think about little else. A backup on a holiday weekend, a soaked patch over the drain field, a whiff of sulfur near the tank cover, these issues bring genuine expenses and a fair quantity of tension.
