5. Wait for Steam to scan and re-download any missing or damaged files, then launch the video game.

2. Update Graphics Drivers

- **NVIDIA Users:** Download the GeForce Experience app or check out the NVIDIA website to set up the most recent Game Ready Driver.
- **AMD Users:** Use the AMD Software: Adrenalin Edition to check for updates.

Pro-tip: If crashes persist after an upgrade, use a totally free tool like **DDU (Display Driver Uninstaller)** in Safe Mode to totally wipe your old motorists before setting up fresh ones.

3. Clean Up Launch Options

Launch choices can drastically modify how CS: GO uses your hardware. Nevertheless, older commands typically contravene modern-day Windows updates.

Follow these steps to reset your launch options:

1. Open Steam Library -> > Right-click **CS: GO** -> > **Properties**.
2. Under the **General** tab, locate the **Launch Options** text box.

4. Disable Overlays and Background Applications

- **Discord Overlay:** Go to User Settings > > App Settings > > Overlay > > Toggle "In-game overlay" off.
- **Steam Overlay:** Steam Settings > > In-Game > > Uncheck "Enable the Steam Overlay while in-game."
- **NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay:** Open GeForce Experience > > Settings > > General > Toggle off "In-Game Overlay."
- **Third-party software:** MSI Afterburner, RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS), and Razer Cortex can occasionally conflict with the Source engine.

Issue Type Symptom Immediate Action to Take **Corrupted Files** Video game crashes on map load Confirm integrity of video game files via Steam. **Chauffeur Conflict** Screen goes black, video game freezes Update GPU motorists or carry out a tidy install by means of DDU. **Overheating** PC shuts down entirely during matches Clean dust from fans; display CPU/GPU temperatures. **Memory Leak** Video game stutters and crashes after 1+ hours

Clear background apps and restart the PC. **Software Hook** Immediate CTD (Crash to Desktop) on launch Disable Discord and Steam overlays.

Advanced Solutions for Persistent Crashes

If the standard steps have not resolved the issue, it's time to look deeper into your os and hardware setup.

Run an SFC Scan (System File Checker)

Corrupted Windows system files can interrupt DirectX and other APIs needed by CS: GO.

1. Press the Windows Key, type cmd.
2. Right-click **Command Prompt** and choose **Run as administrator**.
3. Type sfc/ scannow and press Enter.
4. Let the scan complete, restart your PC, and check the video game.

Change Virtual Memory (Pagefile)

Running out of RAM or Virtual Memory can trigger sudden crashes mid-game. Making sure Windows manages your pagefile instantly can avoid this:

1. Press the Windows Key, type **Advanced system settings**, and open it.
2. Under the **Advanced** tab, click **Settings** under the Performance section.
3. Go to the **Advanced** tab again and click **Change** under Virtual memory.
4. Ensure **Automatically handle paging file size for all drives** is inspected.

Test for Hardware Instability

If your CPU or RAM is aggressively overclocked (through XMP/EXPO or manual tweaks), the Source engine can be notoriously conscious instability.

- Momentarily disable XMP/DOCP in your BIOS to see if crashes stop.
- Run a tension test program like Prime95 or MemTest86 to look for defective hardware elements.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

Q: Why does CS: GO crash specifically when loading a map?A: Map packing crashes are often tied to missing out on, damaged, or outdated map files. Confirming your video game cache via Steam or unsubscribing from problematic Workshop maps usually solves this instantly.

Q: What should I do if my entire PC freezes (Hard Lock) requiring a manual reboot?A: A complete system freeze typically points toward a hardware concern-- most frequently GPU instability, overheating, or a stopping

working power supply. Examine your temperatures using software application like HWMonitor and ensure your graphics card motorists are completely up-to-date.
