The Mechanics Behind CS2 Casinos

1. The Steam Web API and Bot Trades

CS2 casinos do not link straight [CS Gambling Site](#) to Valve's servers for financial transactions. Rather, they utilize the Steam Web API to help with peer-to-peer trades or bot-controlled stock transfers. When a gamer transfers a skin, a trade offer is sent to a designated automatic bot account. 2. Provably Fair Systems
