



A slow drain rarely announces itself as a serious problem. It starts small. The kitchen sink takes a little longer to empty after dinner. The upstairs shower leaves an inch of water around your feet. The bathroom sink makes that familiar gurgling sound when someone flushes the toilet nearby. Most homeowners live with these signs longer than they should, partly because they seem manageable and partly because drains sit in that category of home systems nobody wants to think about until they fail.
