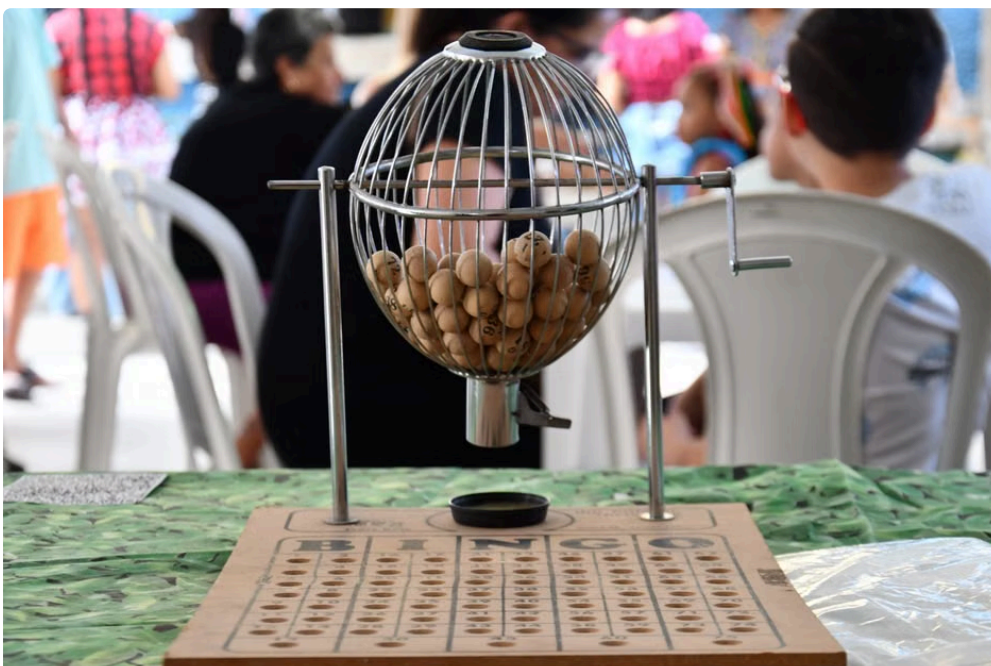
Comparing Physical Bingo Nights and Online Bingo: What’s Similar, What’s Different?
