It can house a betta with a few tank mates (like snails or nano shrimp), a school of small schooling fish (like chili rasboras), or a nest of cherry shrimp.

2. Medium Tanks (20 to 55 Gallons)

- **55 Gallon:** The timeless rectangle-shaped tank. A 55-gallon offers keepers the capability to mix several species, produce striking mid-sized community tanks, or keep moderately sized cichlids. However, note that a 55-gallon is fairly narrow front-to-back, which can restrict aquascaping depth.

3. Big and Giant Tanks (75 Gallons and Up)

- **Available Space and Maintenance Access:** Consider the physical measurements. Will the tank fit through entrances throughout a move? Is there enough clearance above the tank to carry out water changes, gravel vacuuming, and filter upkeep?
- **Spending plan:** Larger tanks need larger heating systems, more powerful filters, more substrate, and more ornamental elements. Ongoing expenses (electrical power, water conditioner, fish food) also scale up with tank size.
