

North Bellmore does not usually announce itself with big tourist spectacles, and that is part of its appeal. It is the kind of place that reveals itself in layers, through quiet residential streets, long-standing storefronts, neighborhood parks, and the rhythm of everyday life on the South Shore of Nassau County.
