2. **The Steam Community Market:** Once skins have been purchased or dropped, players can purchase and sell them freely on the Steam Market. Prices are dictated by supply and need, implying uncommon or popular skins can increase in value.
3. **Random In-Game Drops:** Simply playing on authorities or neighborhood servers grants random item drops over time, though these are generally lower-tier typical or unusual items.

4. **Jerk Drops:** Facepunch frequently partners with popular material developers to offer exclusive, time-limited skins for audiences who see taking part streams.
