

If you find hornets near your home in North York, the safest starting point is to stay calm, stay back, and avoid disturbing the nest site. Hornets are **aggressive insects** that can become highly defensive especially so if they feel their **hornet nest** is in danger. If you suspect the nest is near a wall, soffit, or roof edge, maintain a safe perimeter and avoid the area until it is assessed.

Also, **don't swat**. Many people react instinctively when a hornet buzzes nearby, but swatting increases the chance of stings and can make the insect more aggressive. Instead, move gently and calmly away from the area. If several hornets are present, do not attempt a DIY treatment with sprays or tools unless a qualified professional has advised you to do so.

Protect **children and pets** at once. Bring pets indoors and keep kids away from the area where hornets are flying. If a nest is near a backyard play space, front steps, or a shared fence line, redirect outdoor activity until you know more.
