- **Cease and Desist Letters:** Valve has traditionally targeted significant skin gambling operators, requiring they closed down their services or face legal action from the company.
- **API Restrictions:** By limiting automated trade bots and implementing trade cooldowns, Valve has actually made it substantially harder for platforms to process instantaneous deposits and withdrawals.
- **Account Bans:** Users caught using their Steam inventories for business gambling operations risk having their individual Steam accounts permanently banned, leading to the loss of their whole game and skin libraries.

Despite these efforts, the need remains so high that brand-new platforms constantly emerge to change those that shut down.
