For non-EU/EEA license holders (e.g., USA, India, UK post-Brexit, Ukraine), the guidelines are more stringent:

- Licenses from nations that signed the **1968 Vienna Convention on Road Traffic** can usually be exchanged straight, though tests may be needed depending on bilateral agreements and residency duration.
- Licenses from nations under the **1949 Geneva Convention** usually need passing the theoretical state test.

Yes. A PESEL number (or a substitute tax identifier in particular temporary cases) is mandatory for producing your PKK profile and registering for exams in Poland.
