Moderate (House edge constructed into the green tile) **Coinflip** A direct 1v1 PvP video game where 2 players wager equal skin values. A virtual coin is flipped, and the winner takes the entire pot (minus a small website commission). Low-to-Moderate (50/50 chances minus platform rake) **Jackpot/ Pot** Multiple players deposit skins into a common pool. Each skin adds to the player's "ticket" share. A random ticket is drawn, and the winner takes the entire pot. High (Depends on the portion of the pot owned) **Case Opening** Simulates the main Valve case openings, frequently with greater or tailored odds and distinct prize swimming pools. High (Typically unfavorable go back to gamer ratios) **Esports Betting** Wagering skins or cash on professional CS: GO/CS2 matches (e.g., ESL Pro League, Majors) based on live odds. Skill/Knowledge-dependent (Moderate threat)
