



Oral health rarely declines all at once. More often, it slips a little at a time. A spot that traps plaque goes unnoticed for months. Gum tissue stays mildly inflamed after brushing because the flossing never became consistent. A filling that seemed fine a few years ago starts leaking at the edge, quietly allowing bacteria underneath. By the time pain appears, the problem has usually been building for a while.
