The Technology Behind the Games: Provably Fair Systems

To combat uncertainty and develop trust amongst users, reputable CS: GO gambling sites utilize **Provably Fair** algorithms. This cryptographic system permits players to individually verify that the outcome of every bet or spin was genuinely random and not controlled by the platform operators.

- **How it works:** Before a round starts, the server creates a secret "seed" and hashes it, showing the hash to the gamer. The gamer's internet browser contributes a customer seed. When the round ends, the server exposes the original secret seed, allowing the user to use a third-party verifier to check that the result matched the pre-determined hash.
