3. Trade them straight with other gamers by means of Steam trades.
4. Gamble or offer them on third-party market sites (though players must constantly work out care with external websites).

Popular Skin Themes

Over the years, certain skin collections have controlled the neighborhood's choices. Gamers often buy matching sets to give their base and equipment a combined look. A few of the most popular styles consist of:

- **Glowing (Glow-in-the-Dark):** Highly searched for because they permit gamers to see their weapons and hotbars in dark environments or during the Rust night cycle.
