

I didn't start out trying to chase terpenes. Like a lot of people in Memphis, I started with the basics: I wanted something that felt gentler than the usual options, something that could take the edge off without turning my day into a foggy blur. - Others feel lighter, more clear-headed, or better for evening wind-down without complete shutdown.

Now, here's the part many shoppers miss: terpene profile is not just about "what's in the jar." It's also about balance. A dominant terpene can guide the experience, but ratios matter. Start low, but don’t start so low you can’t learn
