Popular Case Battle Modes

To keep the gameplay fresh, third-party platforms have actually presented several variations to the basic formula:

- **Provably Fair Systems:** Look for websites that utilize "Provably Fair" algorithms, which allow users to mathematically validate that the outcome of each battle was completely random and unmanipulated.
