Quick Diagnostic Checklist

When a crash takes place, players must not immediately turn to re-installing the whole game. Rather, follow this diagnostic list to narrow down the source:

1. **Note the Error Message:** Does the game crash to desktop (CTD) quietly, or does it reveal a specific error code (like engine.dll or memory allowance errors)?
2. **Check System Temperatures:** Overheating CPUs and GPUs will immediately throttle or close down procedures to prevent permanent hardware damage.
3. **Verify Recent Changes:** Did the crash start occurring instantly after a Windows update, a graphics motorist update, or the installation of brand-new peripherals?

Step-by-Step Troubleshooting Solutions

1. Confirm Integrity of Game Files

- **AMD Users:** Open AMD Software: Adrenalin Edition, browse to *Checking for Updates*, and install the recommended software application package.
- **Pro Tip:** For relentless problems, carry out a "Clean Installation" utilizing an utility like Display Driver Uninstaller (DDU) to clean old driver caches completely before setting up the fresh plan.

3. Adjust Launch Options

- **Step 1:** Navigate to the video game setup directory (typically C: \ Program Files (x86)\ Steam \ steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).
- **Step 2:** Locate the main executable file (csgo.exe).
- **Action 3:** Right-click the file and choose **Properties**.
- **Step 4:** Go to the **Compatibility** tab.
- **Step 5:** Check the box for **Disable fullscreen optimizations**.

- **Step 6:** Click *Apply* and *OK*.

Advanced Troubleshooting

If standard software application fixes fail to solve the crashing problem, the problem might lie much deeper within the operating system or hardware setup.



Managing Overclocks (CPU, GPU, and RAM)

Many competitive players overclock their hardware to eke out every last frame per second (FPS). Nevertheless, source engines can be infamously conscious unsteady overclocks.

- If the system has an aggressive CPU or GPU overclock used by means of MSI Afterburner or the BIOS, go back the clock speeds back to factory stock settings to check stability.
- **XMP/EXPO Profiles:** Unstable RAM profiles can cause unforeseen video game crashes and memory read mistakes. Attempt disabling XMP/DOCP in the BIOS briefly to see if crashes persist.

Running as Administrator

Permissions problems can occasionally avoid the game from composing needed cache files to the storage drive.

- Find csgo.exe, right-click it, choose **Properties**, go to the **Compatibility** tab, and check **Run this program as an administrator**.

Re-installing the Game

As a last resort, a tidy reinstallation guarantees that no residual conflicting files from old updates stay. Uninstall the game through Steam, manually delete any staying folders in the steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive directory, and download a fresh copy.
