

What makes horse feed right for pregnant mares?

The best **horse feed** for **pregnant mares** is one that supports steady **broodmare nutrition**, maintains an ideal **body condition score**, and fits the mare's stage of **gestation**. The right choice is not just about calories. The middle stage of pregnancy may still be mostly consistent, but late pregnancy brings more significant nutrient demands as the fetus grows quickly and the mare prepares for lactation.

Protein becomes especially important because it supplies building blocks for tissue development. More specifically, the quality of protein matters. **Amino acids** like **lysine** are essential for healthy growth, and feeds that are strong in amino acid profile often perform better than generic mixes. Energy needs also rise, but the source of that energy should be selected thoughtfully. Highly digestible fiber and controlled starch levels are often better than a large amount of plain grain.

Minerals become a major issue, especially in the later stages of gestation. **Calcium** and **phosphorus** must be supplied in an appropriate ratio, while **trace minerals** such as copper and zinc help support skeletal development and overall health. **Vitamin E** also matters, especially when pasture access is limited. In many broodmare programs, a forage-based ration with a properly fortified concentrate is more effective than a feed built only around starch.

As pregnancy progresses, evaluate the mare's appetite, manure consistency, coat condition, and body condition score. Those practical signs help you decide whether the current ration is working or whether the mare needs a more nutrient-dense horse feed.

Top horse feed options for gestating mares

The best feed depends on each mare, available hay, and the budget, but a number of commercial brands are commonly considered in broodmare programs. **Purina horse feed, tribute horse feed, nutrena horse feed, and triumph horse feed** all feature products that can fit different life stages and feeding goals. When to choose fortified broodmare feed

A fortified broodmare feed is usually the best choice when forage alone cannot satisfy the mare’s needs, when the mare is losing condition, or when her diet must support fetal growth more precisely. These feeds often include elevated levels of **protein**, more complete amino acid coverage, and added **calcium, phosphorus, and trace minerals**.

The most common additions are mineral balancers, salt blocks, or specific vitamins if the forage analysis shows a gap.
