They know which shrubs tend to push too hard in spring, which turf areas burn out in August, and which corners of a property stay wet after heavy rain. That familiarity matters. It leads to faster diagnosis, fewer mistakes, and better decisions over time.

A missed pruning cycle might not seem urgent in May, but by late summer the overgrowth can block sightlines, crowd healthy plants, and make the entire property look unmanaged.
