0.15-- 0.38 Visible wear, scratches on paint and metallic parts. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Significant wear, paint heavily faded or chipped. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Badly damaged, frequently entirely altering the look of the weapon.

Note: Some skins are "capped," implying they can not drop in Factory New condition, making [CS2 Gambling CS2 Skin](#) lower-float variants extremely rare and costly.

Rarity Tiers and Finishes

Skins are categorized into different rarity tiers, which determine their drop rates in cases and total eminence.

- **Customer Grade (White):** Common, fundamental drops.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly less common low-tier products.
- **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard weapon surfaces found in the majority of cases.
- **Restricted (Purple):** Higher-tier weapons, frequently used in trade-ups.
