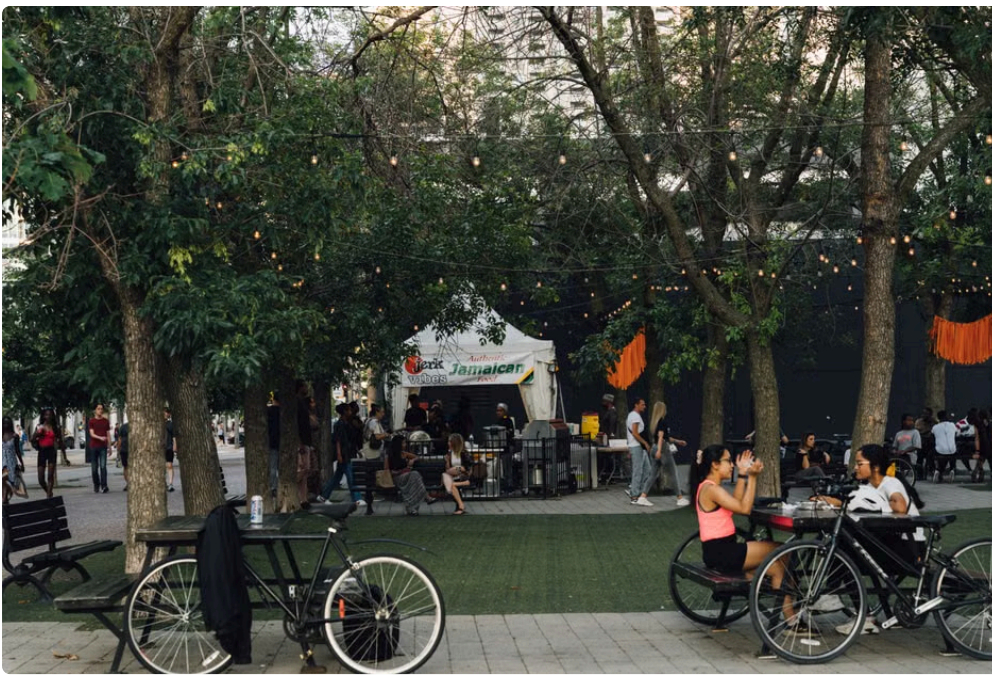

based on user behaviour.

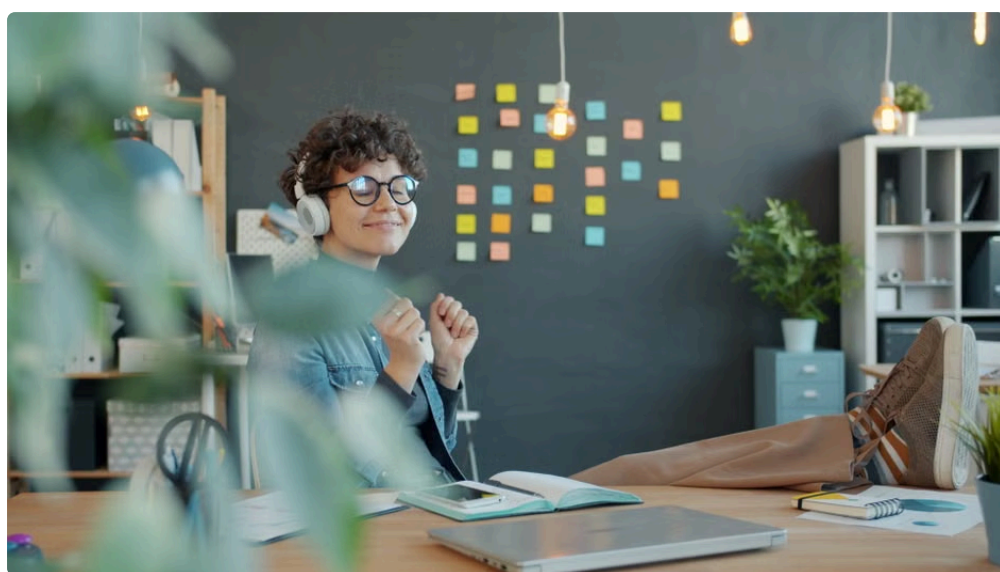
