

How should I prepare before pest control treatment?

If you're booking **pest control Ottawa** services, the smartest thing you can do is stick to a simple **pre-treatment checklist** before the technician arrives. Good prep helps the treatment work better, reduces delays, and makes the visit safer for your household. Don't forget about **furniture**. You may need to move couches, chairs, or storage bins a short distance away from walls so the technician can inspect baseboards and cracks. The more open the work area, the more detailed the inspection and treatment can be.

A simple cleanup before treatment often includes the following:

- **Vacuum thoroughly** in affected rooms, especially edges, corners, and under appliances if you can safely reach them.

- Clean and **clear countertops** in kitchens and bathrooms.
- Store dishes and utensils in closed cupboards or sealed bins.
- Move furniture away from walls where access is needed.
- Pick up laundry, pet toys, and floor clutter to reveal possible pest activity.
