1. **Weapon Model:** Knives like the Karambit, Butterfly Knife, and M9 Bayonet normally command the greatest market costs, while navigation knives like the Navaja or Shadow Daggers are valued much lower.
2. **Skin Finish:** Finishes like Doppler (specifically stages and the uncommon Sapphire/Ruby/Black Pearl variants), Fade, and Case Hardened (particularly with high blue percentages) increase the base worth tremendously.
