Broken down granite courses look right at home and percolate water, though you should support them well if you anticipate wheelbarrows, strollers, or high foot traffic. Get the spacing incorrect and a bed looks sparse for several years or overgrown by fall. Blooming windows are easy to stagger with Penstemon in late spring, Salvia clevelandii through summer season, and Muhlenbergia capillaris for fall color in soft pink clouds.

If you require a usable green surface, synthetic turf can be a smart tool, supplied you install it like a sports field rather than a doormat. The very best synthetic grass setup in Pasadena begins with excavation, graded base rock, appropriate edging, and infill that keeps blades upright while decreasing heat. Pair synthetic grass with genuine planting around it so the space looks intentional, not plastic.

Reading the site before you draw a line

On every project, the most valuable hours happen before any demo starts. You look and listen, then determine whatever. Microclimate, slope, existing energies, neighbor views, and noise from Fair Oaks or the 210, all inform the strategy. - Sun and shade pattern by hour in June and December

- Lines of sight from interior spaces to the backyard and from neighbors to you

A new 24-inch high keeping wall in smooth block held a terrace with a view line to the San Gabriels. Planting covered the patio area in layers: two multi-stem olives for shade and structure, wanders of Salvia 'Pozo Blue' for summer season blossom, Lomandra 'Breeze' to stitch the edges, and rosemary creeping down the wall face. Subsurface drip on 2 zones, synthetic grass for a small play strip, and a swale that caught roofing system overflow. 2 years later, the clients water when a week in July and August, skip irrigation totally from December to March, and host suppers without dragging chairs across gravel.

Another job off Sierra Madre Boulevard had an extreme side backyard slope that funneled water to the back entrance. We solved it by regrading the side lawn to develop a shallow swale away from your house, adding permeable pavers for the path, and installing a catch basin tied to a dry well sized at roughly one gallon per square foot of contributing roof. The yard itself gained a paver patio area in a herringbone pattern, which holds small areas well, and a pergola with a retractable shade. The planting strikes a balance in between locals and Mediterranean imports, with manzanita for winter season bloom and westringia formed into soft mounds. No more water at the limit, and the course now invites an early morning walk with coffee.

Working with the best team
