- **Gem Knives (Ruby, Sapphire, Black Pearl):** Specific Doppler knife finishes where the blade is totally covered in a single shade, complimentary of the basic various colored swirls.
- **Blue Gems (Case Hardened):** Case Hardened patterns can range from mainly gold to nearly totally strong blue. A Tier-1 "Blue Gem" Karambit or AK-47 can command six-figure amounts because the odds of rolling that specific pattern index are astronomically low.
