Classified (Pink)	~ 3.20%	Rare weapon skins, typically carrying a decent market value.
Covert (Red)	~ 0.64%	The highest standard weapon tier; highly coveted and normally expensive.
Unique Item (Gold/Knife/Gloves)	~ 0.26%	The holy grail of case opening; exceptionally uncommon knives or glove versions.
