

Knoxville has a way of surprising people who only know it from the interstate signs and the occasional football weekend. Spend enough time here and the city starts to reveal its layers, the riverfront and ridgelines, the old brick warehouses, the neighborhoods with shade trees older than the houses themselves, and the mix of preservation and daily wear that comes with a city that has been lived in, loved, and weathered for generations. The city's older places need a gentler touch

That is important because not every exterior can be treated the same way. Historic brick may have mortar that has softened with age. Painted wood can flake if hit too aggressively. 3. Decks, patios, and porches, which can become slippery and dull from buildup.
4. Fences and retaining walls, where weather exposure creates uneven staining.
