

# What Is Textured Horse Feed?

Blended horse feed is a type of **horse feed** made with a combination of processed grains, added nutrients, and often visible whole ingredients such as oats, corn, pellets, and molasses. Thanks to that mixed appearance, it is often called a “sweet feed” or **sweet feed for horses**. The goal is to create a appealing, high-energy concentrate that horses will eat readily while still supplying protein, vitamins and minerals, and sometimes extra fat content for condition and performance.
