3. **Secure the Opening:** Cover the window opening to stay out rain and wind. Sturdy plastic sheeting (visqueen) taped securely to the frame with duct tape or painter's tape works well. For a sturdier short-lived barrier, cut a piece of plywood to fit comfortably inside the frame and secure it with screws or nails.
