Sizing Rules for Round Mirrors Over a Double Vanity

One of my quirks is I *always decide lighting before mirror width*. The spacing and style of your vanity lighting—especially sconces or hardwired LED features—dictate how much wall space your mirror has and where it “lives” visually. Here’s a breakdown:

1. **Vanity Width and Basin Spacing:** A typical double vanity is 60"-72" wide, with two sinks spaced approximately 24"-30" apart center to center.
2. **Mirror Width:** Each mirror should roughly correspond to the basin width but also leave space for sconces or lighting flanks. Experts recommend leaving at least 4"-6" clearance between the mirror edge and each wall or light fixture.
3. **Mirror Height and Placement:** Mount the bottom edge of the mirror about 3" to 6" above backsplash or vanity countertop to keep it functional and easy to clean.

Applying these rules to round mirrors means sizing each mirror to approximately 24"-30" in diameter for a standard basin width. The **mirror spacing double vanity** layout is critical: the round mirrors should be centered over each sink with 6"-8" between the two mirror edges to avoid a cramped appearance.



Too close and it looks crowded; too far apart and the vanity space feels disjointed.

Placement Heights and Sconce Spacing

- **Ambient Lighting:** General ceiling fixtures or recessed lighting provide overall illumination but are insufficient alone for detail work.
- **Integrated LED Mirrors:** Some modern round mirrors incorporate hardwired LED illumination, often installed by electricians working in tandem with the glazier. These mirrors provide consistent light but need added electrical feeds planned early on.

When you choose round mirrors for a double sink layout, decide whether you want sconces on each side or trusted LED backs or front lighting integrated into the mirror frame.

Working with Glaziers and Electricians

Installing large plate glass round mirrors involves a glazier who handles templating and precise mounting. This is especially true if you want custom sizes or tempered glass for durability. It's essential to provide the glazier with exact measurements after sizing and positioning lights.

Electricians play a key role for mirrors with hardwired LED lighting. Coordinating added electrical feeds early ensures clean installs, avoiding visible conduits or uneven lighting.

In my experience:
