| <b>Battle-Scarred (BS)</b> | 0.45-- 1.00 | Extremely worn, often altering the graphic totally. <i>(Note: Some skins look distinctively cool in BS, referred to as "Blackscars").</i> |

### StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™:** Items with this innovation include an orange LED counter that tracks the variety of confirmed eliminates made with that specific weapon.
- **Memento Packages:** These are dropped throughout official Valve-sponsored esports competitions (Majors) and function gold sticker labels representing the groups and MVP of the round.

### The Rarity Tiers

Valve organizes CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which dictate how frequently they drop in-game or emerge <https://cs2skin.com/cases> from weapon cases.

1. **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, basic drops.

2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly much better than Consumer, common in containers.
3. **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard lower-tier case drops.
