

Dix Hills has a way of feeling both rooted and comfortable. It is the kind of place where the roads widen into mature neighborhoods, the trees seem to have been there longer than the houses, and a simple errand can turn into a reminder of how much careful planning goes into keeping a community livable. On the surface, it is a suburban hamlet in western Suffolk County.
