When Facepunch introduces brand-new skins to the main Item Store every Thursday, players buy them directly from Steam at a repaired price. Once purchased, these items have a one-week trade restriction. After that week ends, gamers can trade them with buddies or offer them on the **Steam Community Market** for Steam Wallet funds.

This creates a dynamic marketplace determined by supply and demand. Rare skins, ceased items, and those preferred by popular material developers can escalate in worth.

Secret Factors Influencing Skin Prices

- **Supply:** How many copies of the skin were acquired during its time in the main shop. Low-supply items frequently appreciate in value.

- **Demand:** Is the skin aesthetically pleasing? Does it provide tactical benefits (like camouflage)?
- **Youtuber/Streamer Hype:** If a popular *Rust* content creator uses a specific skin set, demand for those items often rises.
- **Meta Changes:** If a particular weapon or armor piece ends up being heavily favored in the present game meta, skins for that item might see an increase in popularity.
