turn the screws clockwise to raise the door or counter-clockwise to decrease it. Adjust both sides evenly up until the door glides efficiently and sits level in the frame.

2. Fixing Sagging or Misaligned Hinged Glass Doors

Hinged glass doors-- such as interior glass doors or patio area French doors-- frequently experience gravity. The heavy glass panel puts tremendous pressure on the hinges, causing the door to sag and scrape versus the threshold.

- **Action 1: Inspect the Hinges**Open the door and inspect the screws on all hinges. Frequently, a drooping door is simply caused by loose hinge screws retreating from the door frame.
- **Action 2: Tighten or Replace Screws**Tighten any loose screws. If the screw holes have actually become removed (indicating the screw spins without tightening), remove the screw, place a little piece of wooden toothpick or a wall anchor into the hole along with wood glue, and then re-insert the screw for a tight grip.
- **Step 3: Adjust Hinge Tension or Position**If tightening up the screws does not deal with the sag, adjust the specific adjustment screws discovered on modern-day adjustable hinges, or utilize a shim behind the bottom hinge to press the door back into positioning.

3. Replacing Worn Weatherstripping

If a glass door allows cold drafts throughout winter season or enables conditioned air to escape in the summertime, the weatherstripping has likely deteriorated.

- **Step 1: Remove Old Weatherstripping**Peel away the old rubber, vinyl, or felt weatherstripping from the door frame or the edge of the door. Utilize a putty knife to scrape away any lingering adhesive residue.
- **Action 2: Clean the Surface**Clean down the application area with rubbing alcohol to make sure a tidy, dust-free surface for the brand-new adhesive.
- **Step 3: Install the New Material**Step the border of the door frame and cut the new weatherstripping to size. Press firmly into location, ensuring a tight seal when the door is closed without making it excessively difficult to lock.
