What Are CS: GO Case Keys?

When a secret is applied, the video game RNG (random number generator) identifies which skin drops from the case. The secret is consumed after a **case opening** single use.

Case secrets can not be moved between various case families; you should use the matching secret for the corresponding case. The Steam Community Market lists secrets for each case separately, and some third-party sites sell them also.

How Case Keys Work

1. **Acquire a case**-- Cases can be made by playing main video game modes, bought from the Steam Market, or received as drops.
2. **Get a matching secret**-- The secret needs to represent the case you intend to open.
3. **Open the case**-- In the video game's main menu, select "Inventory → Cases → Open". Insert the key and confirm.
4. **RNG result**-- The system rolls a value that maps to a rarity tier (Consumer, Industrial, Mil-Spec, Restricted, Classified, Covert, or Rare Special Item). The final skin is then added to the player's inventory.

It's important to bear in mind that case keys are **non-refundable** and **non-tradeable** as soon as utilized. Unused keys can be traded or sold on the Steam Community Market, but after activation they vanish.

Types of Case Keys

Below is a concise table of the most common case keys, their associated cases, and normal market rates (rates are approximate and change based on supply and need).

Acquiring Keys: Where and How

1. Steam Community Market (SCM)

- **Pros:** Direct combination with the video game; keys are quickly delivered to your inventory.
- **Cons:** Prices are set by the community and might be higher throughout high-demand periods.

2. Licensed Third-Party Retailers

- **Pros:** Often use discounted rates, bulk bundles, and periodic promos.
- **Cons:** You must validate the website's legitimacy; some resellers run gray-market plans.

3. In-Game Store (for select cases)

- **Pros:** Simple deal utilizing Steam Wallet funds.
- **Cons:** Limited choice; not all case keys are readily available for direct purchase.

4. Trade Offers

- **Pros:** Can obtain keys by trading undesirable skins.
- **Cons:** Requires settlement and trust in the trading partner.

Tips for Buying and Using Case Keys

- **Match the key to the case:** Using an inaccurate key will lead to an error message and waste of the key.
- **Examine market cost before getting:** Prices vary; buying during a market dip can save cash.

- **Avoid "crucial generators" or "complimentary key" frauds:** No genuine source offers keys away for free; such deals are frequently phishing efforts.
- **Buy wholesale for a discount rate:** Some third-party sellers minimize the per-key cost when you buy a pack of 10 or more.
- **Consider the odds:** The likelihood of receiving a high-value skin is low (often less than 1%). Deal with case opening as home entertainment rather than an investment.
- **Enable Steam Guard:** Protect your account from unauthorized trades when purchasing secrets from external sources.
- **Utilize the "Buy" function on SCM:** It makes sure the transaction is safe and secure and instantly credits the secret to your stock.

Secret Pricing and Market Trends

The cost of a case secret is driven by several aspects:

1. **Rarity of the case:** Older or stopped cases typically command greater key costs.

- **Regional rates:** Some secrets may be less expensive in specific areas due to currency fluctuations; however, buying from informal sources can lead to account limitations.
- **Scams and fraud:** Always confirm the legitimacy of a seller. Try to find evaluations, utilize escrow services when possible, and never ever share your Steam login qualifications.
