- **The Steam Community Market:** The best platform to purchase and sell skins from other gamers using Steam Wallet funds.
- **Random Drops:** Active gamers get random, non-tradeable/non-marketable standard skins just by playing the game (the "Playtime" drop system).
- **Third-Party Marketplaces:** External sites that allow gamers to buy skins using fiat currency or cryptocurrency, frequently with the choice to squander to a bank account.
- **Twitch Drops:** Special marketing occasions where gamers connect their Steam and Twitch accounts to make special, time-limited skins by enjoying participating banners.
