- **The 2016 Cease-and-Desist Era:** Valve sent out official notifications to lots of popular skin gambling sites, demanding they shut down operations as they violated the Steam Subscriber Agreement.
- **Trade Hold Updates:** To suppress instantaneous trading and cash laundering, Valve introduced a mandatory 7-day trade hold on any traded skin. While this briefly interrupted the gambling market, operators rapidly adjusted utilizing P2P systems and crypto cash-outs.
- **Legal Scrutiny:** Governments worldwide have started taking notice. Class-action lawsuits, government examinations, and statutory bans in numerous countries have forced operators to continuously move domains and legal structures.
