3. Live roulette

Comparable to conventional casino roulette, however generally adapted with 3 outcomes (red, black, and green/multiplier) represented by CS2 skin colors or team logos.

4. Coinflip

A basic 1v1 video game where two gamers wager skins or credits of approximately equivalent value. The system flips a virtual coin, and the winner takes the entire pot (minus a little site commission, called the "rake").



5. Prize

Numerous players deposit skins into a main swimming pool. A virtual timer counts down, and a winner is selected through a lottery game system. The greater the worth of the skins a player deposits, the higher their analytical chance of winning the whole pot.

Security, Risks, and Security Measures

Because CS2 gambling sites run outside of Valve's direct control, users should exercise severe care. Engaging with these platforms carries several noteworthy risks:

- **Scams and Phishing:** Fake sites frequently imitate popular gambling platforms to take Steam login qualifications or high-tier inventory items.

- **Active Support:** Reliable platforms normally provide 24/7 client support through live chat or a ticketing system.

Best Practices for Safe Participation
