How the CS2 Gambling Ecosystem Works

1. Steam API and Peer-to-Peer (P2P) Trading

- **Dependency and Mental Health:** The gamified nature of opening digital cases and chasing losses can activate compulsive gambling behaviors, particularly amongst more youthful audiences who form the core group of CS2.
