- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has legally pressured prominent platform operators to shut down their operations or pivot far from using Steam-related infrastructure.

Despite these measures, operators continue to adapt by making use of peer-to-peer marketplaces, alternative cryptocurrencies, and offshore licensing to keep their platforms running.
